Generally

- Both players and referees learning by each lesson
- Young referees without routine
- > Will to improve and grow, but:
 - Good in communication?
 - Understanding of the game
 - Less stability
 - Influenced from many sides
- Less experience more emotions
- > New players, new actions, new situations
- Fast handball: how many attacks per match?
- Less or more power by players?
- > Young and female referees considered as normal
- > Some players try to start as referees, too







At European championships

- > specific EHF nominations
 - young referees
 - different levels
 - > more or less experienced
 - motivated referees
- selected national teams
 - > top 16 teams out of 50 nations
 - main vs.intermediate group motivation
- > delegates' supervision and observation
- > daily work with referees
 - too much is too much
- > special rules / regulations



Courses with young referees nominated by countries

- Selected tournaments
- Selected lecturers / mentors
 - Help of top active referees
- Focused on whistelling (up to 8 matches a day)
- > All program in English
- YRP badge for the best participants
- > 1+1+1 couples per nation
- Most of current EHF elite referees came via YRP

Young Refereeing - examples

- whistle too fast
- thinking too much
 - compensation?
 - not deciding "against someone"
- don't know how to work with team officials
- covering a mistake by "a punishment"
 - I'm not sure so I will add a punishment
- simply confused





- unknown and unpredictable referees
 - most couples used in qualifications
- variable performance
 - often visible progress during an event
- confusion from too many new advices
 - we keep the courses short and simple... not to get crazy
- success in the main round
 - ... and a catastrophy if I whistle the bottom
- what they think what they see what happened?
- unbalanced respect between refs and coaches
 - meetings with coaches
- neutrality vs. idendification with a team





Evaluation of referees

In the Young Referees Project, we only use 5-8 criteria evaluated in parallel by both observer and referees
