Starting from 2001 EHF has established common courses for Referees, Delegates and later Coaches. Before that, one introduction course for referees for set up in preparation to Gaeta 2000.

The first course was held in UKR, in Yuzhny and I come from there.....long road to reach Budaors indeed...



After few years and experiences the BH Commission, established on 2008, decided to use the EBT Finals as preparation to the major events of the year: the Senior European Championships.

Therefore most of the referees and delegates nominated are invited to a Further Education course in the days before teh EBT Finals.



And that is why you are here in this third edition of the Course, second together with Delegates.

After 16 years of courses many referees and delegates has achived the EHF official status. Most of our referees has been officials during the World top events, WCh and World Games, officiating various finals, testing the good preparatory work made in the years by Ole Jorstad and Gabriella Horvath

(they gave me € 100 to say that....).



New hard and fascinating challenges are waiting for you, as BH is now officially part of Olympic program starting with YOG in 2018 in Buenos Aires. The leading role of EHF in officials education will se you as our testimonials together with the new collegus that will come in next years.



The system is now standardized as follows: in the odd years Furher Education Courses prior to top European CHs, and in pair years Courses fo Delegates, Referees and coaches.

Both of them make use of EBT Finals, our top club event in Europe, final act of EBT, as field of training for our officials.



Since two years the BH Commission, once more in first row in looking for strategies of education for EHF officials, has fixed three online testing per year to be done through the EHF Family Portal, in order to validate the EHF status forcing officials to an ongoing preparation keeping one eye on the fact that BH is a "seasonal" sport and refreshing is very important for keeping "alive" every personal skill



Officials evaluation...

Actions to be taken for those who fail the test:

2 tests (1 test + resit) failed: Temporary loss of EHF status until next test is passed

4 tests (2 tests + 2 resits) failed: Temporary loss of EHF status + warning to official and resp.

6 tests (3 tests + 3 resits) failed: Exclusion from the list of officials

Actions to be taken for those who refuse to take the test:

2 tests (1 test + resit) ignored: Temporary loss of EHF status until next test is passed

3 tests (2 tests + 1 resit) ignored: Temporary loss of EHF status + warning to official and resp.

national Federation

4 tests (2 tests + 2 resits) ignored: Exclusion from the list of officials

In combinations of ignoring and failing the test, the aforementioned proportionate values will apply (Meaning: If 6 tests in a row are either failed or ignored the official will be excluded). Lost status can be regained by taking a course. The respective conditions will be released at the appropriate time.



Officials status....

54 active referees from 20 countries

31 active delegates from 20 countries (4 with no referees: MNE,MKD,GER,ISR)

No officials from Baltic area, no officials from countries where BH is regularly

played: FRA, POR, MLT

Final consideration: officials coming from less than 50% of EHF member

federations means that in short future we need to incresae pressure on those
