EHF Competitions Commission / Technical Refereeing Commitee

The Competition Commission (CC) has been part of the EHF structure since the foundation of the European Handball Federation in 1992. Back then, there was a Technical Commission dealing with all the technical matters in handball.

Due to the rapid development in handball, the Technical Commission soon split into two new commissions, the Competitions Commission and the Methods Commission. The responsibility of the CC is to deal with all the competitions matters of the EHF events, playing system of competitions and regulations based on the EHF Refereeing structure.

In order to guarantee high level refereeing all over the European handball courts, various programmes have been targeting referee- and delegate education with a special focus on young referees and female referees.

To take the subject to the next level, the EHF Executive Committee took a decision to set up a new specialised body. The EHF Technical Refereeing Committee (TRC) has been called into being to serve as a kind of think tank contributing to the further development of the European refereeing standards.

The EHF Technical Refereeing Committee held its first meeting on Friday, 9 January 2009 in the EHF Headquarters, Vienna.

The chairman of the committee is Sándor Andorka, responsible for refereeing matters within the EHF Competitions Commission. The members Carol Domenge (FRA), Bjarne Munk Jensen (DEN), Jiri Konecny (CZE) and Dragan Nachevski (MKD) complete this committee.







Course Basics

In accordance with the objectives of EHF Integrity Programme, which is currently under construction, and consequently to the ongoing commotion caused by the episodes of undue influence amongst certain areas in the competitive environments between clubs, federations and particularly referees, the EHF in conjunction with g - Partner consultancy has taken proactive steps towards establishing a platform which promotes and ensures that a general consensus is achieved with regard to such vital factors as efficient anti-corruption standards, the adequate handling of newly found pressures and challenges that will no doubt arise for top referees on a European level.

All of which are absolutely integral to a positive and respectable portrayal, perception, and operation of the sport, both internally and amongst the worlds media.

This movement now culminates in the form of a pre-season Top Referee Seminar, as was agreed upon in June of 2009, at the EHF Executive Committee Meeting held in Istanbul, Turkey. It has become increasingly apparent that time is of the essence in this issue, and therefore the scheduling of the seminar before the beginning of the season was crucial. Hereby, an educational and practical seminar will be held on the weekend of August 28th prior to the competitive season, for EHF Top Referees.

At this 3 day seminar in Vienna, Austria a broad yet specific array of topics, skills, and practices will be addressed by area specific experts. Also much emphasis will be placed upon the assessment and development of physical fitness of the individuals.

A further step of this process of improvement being the establishment of the requirement for all Clubs, Federations and EHF Officials to sign a legally binding, and purposely designed Code of Conduct, which coincides harmoniously with the framework of the above-mentioned EHF Integrity Programme.

Objectives

The EHF strives towards attaining a new degree of preparation, both of physical and psychological nature amongst the top referees.

In a bid to achieve this wide-spread and almost standardized level of situation specific behaviours and actions amongst the top referees that are active in European competitions, the seminar programme will be quite extensive. This will include, amongst other major issues the following key points:

- Physical fitness assessment, preparation, and criteria
- Mental skills and methods (with emphasis on stress management)
- · Active discussions regarding primary points of conflict
- Stressing the importance of coherence in behaviour and actions

This will allow for informed and strategic handling of challenging situations, as well as augmenting the general ability to perform consistently.
